# SMART WAYS TO GIVE: THE DONOR-ADVISED FUND

If you want to have an impact and benefit from the tax advantages of giving, consider creating a donor-advised fund (DAF) with CFOC.

A DAF is like an investment account that benefits from tax-free growth—but the purpose is supporting your favorite charities. You can open the account with a gift to the Foundation of cash or appreciated stock. The assets will grow tax-free, and when you establish your account you may be eligible for a tax deduction.

When you use cash to fund your account, you can receive a tax deduction for the gift's value. Talk to your tax adviser about your situation – you may be eligible for a deduction of up to 60% of your adjusted gross income.

If you contribute securities, you won't pay capital-gains tax on their appreciated value, and you can receive a deduction up to 30% of your AGI.

Once your fund is established, you can go online or talk with us about distributing gifts to your charities whenever you prefer. You can name a successor to your fund, so you continue to have an impact on Otsego County. ## STUDENT VOICES, STUDENT CHOICES 2024: EVERYONE **WAS HEARD**

For the third year, Student Voices, Student Choices kicked off Thanksgiving week. Before a hugely supportive audience at the Slade Theater (Hartwick College), six Otsego high school teams presented programs they created to address local needs.



It was an amazing night, and the students all represented their communities well, with creativity and passion. As in previous years, each team received funding for their projects, winning \$2,500 each for their causes.

The overall winner (above) was Schenevus. Their project, to update and revitalize the Dragon Closet, which provides clothing and hygiene products for students in need, won the coveted SVSC trophy.

Other schools included Laurens, Morris,

Oneonta, Worcester, and Cooperstown. Seventy high school students, advisors, and student mentors from Hartwick College were part of this year's program.



## FOC GRANTED \$49,235 IN AWARDS IN FALL OF 2024

Eight county nonprofits shared in the Fall 2024 Awards totalling \$49,235 – in addition to the \$62,000 awarded in the spring of 2024 to additional nonprofits. In the last five years, CFOC has issued awards totaling \$1,082,692 to 382 nonprofits.

The Fall 2024 Awards focus on children from birth through elementary school. They include support for programs dealing with health, education, winter coats, and access to quality nutrition.



Awards went to these nonprofits: Athelas Therapeutic Riding; Bugbee Children's Center; Catholic Charities of Delaware, Otsego, and Schoharie Counties; Community Arts Network of Oneonta; Community Cupboard of Edmeston; Opportunities for Otsego; Rural Health Network of South-Central NY; and Unadilla Community Food Pantry.

# ONOR FUND FOCUS: Karen Schlather

Karen Schlather, a long-time Cooperstown resident, is in some ways new to philanthropy, but she and her son, RB, are



already making a difference in Otsego County through the donor-advised fund (DAF) that they hold with the Community Foundation of Otsego County - the Robert and Karen Schlather Fund.

The fund was the dream of Karen's late husband, Bob, a tax and estates attornery, and a founding member of CFOC. Bob in his lifetime was committed to public service through generous philanthropy and board participation. In his obituary, he stated gifts could be made to the Schlather Fund at CFOC. As gifts came in, Karen met with CFOC board chair Harry Levine and Executive Director Jeff Katz to establish the fund, contributing the assets of a family foundation Bob had created in his lifetime.

Because the donor decides how money from a DAF will be granted, Karen and her son, who lives in Hudson with his husband and Karen's "granddog," a Schipperke, discuss projects that interest them. Karen also works closely with Jeff, "a true mentor" to determine where her philanthropic dollars are directed.

"I have to feel a passion or connection to the organization," said Karen, but ultimately, she and RB know that they made the right decision when they can say, "I think Dad would be happy."
